#### **Meeting Minutes**

The following agenda items were presented collectively of a single motion and roll call vote:

**Motion:** Ms. Wolff moved to approve the minutes of the December 15, 2020; January 12, 2021; and January 27, 2021, Budget Committee meetings. Ms. Kramer seconded the motion.

#### **Roll Call Vote:**

Ms. Campanelli, Ms. Levin, Mr. Delfino, Ms. Kramer, Mr. Piper, Mr. Perez, Mr. Carroll, Mr. Rowe, Ms. Terrones, and Ms. Wolff voted *Yes*. The motion passed.

## 4. <u>Community-Law Enforcement and Other First Responder Partnership for Deflection and Substance Use Disorder Treatment</u>

### Notice of Funding Opportunity

Ms. Murphy said that staff requests permission to issue a notice of funding opportunity (NOFO) for the Community-Law Enforcement and Other First Responder Partnership for Deflection and Substance Use Disorder Treatment Act (CLEP), formerly known as the Community Law Enforcement Partnership for Deflection and Substance Use Disorder Treatment Act. She said the NOFO will support law enforcement and other first responders in developing and implementing collaborative deflection programs that offer an immediate pathway to substance use treatment and other services as an alternative to traditional case processing and involvement in the criminal justice system.

Ms. Murphy explained the NOFO would center on revised legislation that had been sent to the Governor for signature. She said revisions in the legislation include allowing coresponders, such as emergency medical technicians and fire departments, to apply for funding; using funds for training on deflection, medication assistance treatment, and crimogenics; and prioritizing funds for communities that have been impacted by the war on drugs, have police/community relation issues, and have a disproportionate lack of access to mental health and drug treatment.

Ms. Murphy said the new legislation was sent to the Governor's Office for signature on February 4. She said staff would initiate NOFO implementation once the bill was signed.

Ms. Adams said staff anticipated the funds would be available in state fiscal year 2022. She explained staff was requesting NOFO approval so that they could initiate preliminary administrative work needed to immediately administer the funds.

**Motion:** Ms. Wolff moved to approve the recommended SFY22 CLEP NOFO. Mr. Rowe seconded the motion.

#### **Roll Call Vote:**

Ms. Campanelli, Ms. Levin, Mr. Delfino, Ms. Kramer, Mr. Piper, Mr. Perez, Mr. Carroll, Mr. Rowe, Mr. Smith, Ms. Terrones, and Ms. Wolff voted *Yes*. The motion passed.

## 5. <u>Improving Criminal Justice Responses to Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Sexual Assault, and Stalking Grant Program</u>

#### New Designations

Ms. Ratliff said that staff requested adjustments to existing designations to accommodate grant extensions and/or amendments to the Illinois Family Violence Coordinating Council's Improving Criminal Justice Responses to Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Sexual Assault, and Stalking (ICJR) grantees, per the table below:

Ms. Ratliff said that the meeting materials mistakenly identified this funding as supporting Year 1 of a possible three years of programming. She said the funds would support Year 2 of the program.

**Motion:** Mr. Perez moved to approve the recommended FFY19 ICJR designations. Ms. Levin seconded the motion.

#### **Roll Call Vote:**

Ms. Campanelli, Ms. Levin, Mr. Delfino, Ms. Kramer, Mr. Piper, Mr. Perez, Mr. Rowe, Mr. Smith, Ms. Terrones, and Ms. Wolff voted *Yes*. Mr. Carroll recused himself because he is on the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board. The motion passed.

### 6. Prescription Pill and Drug Disposal Fund

Ms. Murphy said that the Prescription Pill and Drug Disposal Fund (PPDD) provides grants to local law enforcement agencies for the purpose of collecting, transporting, and incinerating unwanted pharmaceuticals from residential sources. She said ICJIA received a PPDD appropriation of \$150,000 in SFY21 and that the Budget Committee approved the release of a competitive NOFO for the funds in November 2020. She said staff had since learned the COVID-19 pandemic negatively impacted traditional collection of the unwanted items. She said in working with subject matter experts, a pilot program was developed that would allow for a safe collection process while serving a large geographic population. She said staff recommended that the Budget Committee designate \$150,000 to Livingston County on behalf of the Livingston County Sheriff's Department for the Mobile Prescription Pill Drug Disposal Program.

Pontiac Township High School representatives described the history and merits of the pilot program.

**Motion:** Ms. Campanelli moved to approve the recommended SFY21 PPDD designation. Ms. Kramer seconded the motion.

#### **Roll Call Vote:**

Ms. Campanelli, Ms. Levin, Mr. Delfino, Ms. Kramer, Mr. Piper, Mr. Perez, Mr. Carroll, Mr. Rowe, Mr. Smith, Ms. Terrones, and Ms. Wolff voted *Yes*. The motion passed.

#### 7. Victims of Crime Act

## **Designation Reductions**

Mr. Reichgelt said that many programs had lapsed FFY17 Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) funds due to complications brought on by the COVID-19 epidemic. He said the funds expired September 30, 2020, and are no longer available for use, so they must be returned to the U.S. Office for Victims of Crime. The funds and reasons for rescission included:

## Recommended Designations

Mr. Reichgelt said on August 15, 2019, the Budget Committee approved a notice of funding opportunity for transitional housing, resulting in the designation of \$5,325,321 in FFY18 VOCA funds to the programs listed below for an initial 12 months. He said staff recommended designating \$2,227,102 in FFY18 VOCA funds to continue support for the programs. He said their grant agreements would be amended to include funding for an additional six months. He explained the amendment would help expend funds scheduled to expire September 20, 2021. He said the programs had been highly successful and that a spring grantee meeting was being planned to conduct an evaluation to identify successes, barriers, and service gaps.
